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Les Knoll's open house in Denver NC on the occasion of his 72<sup>nd</sup> birthday. Happy Birthday Les!!






Les pulling his live steam Shay out on the turntable from his beautiful brand new Engine House. As his shirt proudly states he; "Still Plays With Trains".


Their Mandate:





Logging the North Carolina Great Smoky Mountains Volume 1, Crestmont & Champion Fibre By Ronald C. Sullivan









Logging in the North Carolina Great Balsams Volume 2, Sunburst & Champion Fibre Ronald C. Sullivan

So far 3 of the 8 planned volumes are available in print.









"We recently took a trip to EnterTRAINment Junction in West Chester Ohio, exit 22 on route 75 just north of Cincinnati.

It is a HUGE indoor large scale (G Gauge) display of 60 trains traveling thru various dioramas displaying early railroading, middle age railroading and modern railroading. Of course I spent most of the time admiring the early railroading displays and took pictures of Bachmann geared locomotives and Annie's traveling back and forth.

I was blown away by the excellent modeling and the attention paid to the details.

The website gives you the impression that the attraction is geared towards kids as they do have a kiddie Thomas the Tank playground indoors for the kids to climb on but as a model railroad enthusiast I found it to be a most enjoyable experience.
