




Happy New Year to 'Youns' and 'Y'all' down here in the Carolinas.

Dave Smith sent me these photos from his layout, the **Atlantic & White Mountains RR**:











I told Dave I was amazed with his use of figures that bring his layout to life and he sent me this detailed photo of a new Engineer figure he has made to show me what he's done lately:




7/8's Scale next to a standard G Scale Loco for comparison.

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Ram Track Sound. Ram Models Inc. makes sounds cards for everything from cattle sounds, sawmill sounds, city sounds, dock side sounds...you name it to help add realism to your layout.

I put a RAM 75 Diesel Engine card in my GE 45 Ton diesel a few years ago. It sounds like a diesel engine running about mid rpms, that plays in a loop slowly accelerating and decelerating over about a 60 second loop and it sounds convincing enough in the diesel I installed it in so I decided to try them again. I bought another RAM 75 Diesel Sound card and his <u>new</u> RAM 180 Rail Car sound card. Each card was 39 dollars. They're very compact, they come wired with a 9v battery connector, an on/off switch, and come with a cheap, 2" pancake speaker.

Not happy at all with this new version of the RAM 75 Diesel Engine sound card so I'll throw it in my junk drawer and probably forget about it. Something's changed, and not for the better.

The RAM 180 Rail Car sound seems more promising. It's a **new** card and it is powered by a 9v battery like RAMs other cards but it also gets wired in to the motor leads. It will make a sound like an 'idle' and when the voltage increases the motor noise 'rpms' also increase. It comes with

two potentiometer adjustments for idle to your preferred 'MAX' rpm. Ralph said "It sounds like a Mack truck". Well...not quite. In fact...not at all like a Mack Truck.

With the supplied, cheap, 2" pancake speaker it sounds like a cross between a digital Metronome and a Model T Ford with a bad valve tap. I tried all the different mini speakers in my collection that I have and with a 2" Visaton speaker available from Parts Express, installed in a speaker enclosure filled with cotton wool and then placing an old pill bottle or a carboard tube over top of the front of the speaker, <u>also</u> filled with cotton balls to muffle the high frequencies it now sounds like a badly muffled outboard motor boat engine. BUT, that should work okay in my Doodlebug Railcar that I built last year.

I guess what I'm saying is that for convincing locomotive sound the 79 dollar MyLoco sound card is still the cheapest thing you can install in your models, in my opinion, that doesn't sound like total crap. MyLoco cards are synthesized sound and very dependent on the type of speaker and enclosure you put them in as to how realistic they sound. Their sound seems to favor the European locomotives more than US locos. The steam chuff and diesel noise sounds are convincing enough for US locos but the whistles and horns will take a lot of tweaking to make them sound like US locos. You have to spend a lot of time fiddling with all the adjustments to get the whistle/horn sounds to sound like US locos but it is possible. Phoenix is still the 'King' of believable sound cards in my opinion but at twice the price.

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Trivia Question: Piggyback transportation. What does that mean and when did railways start to use it?
