RAIL-FANNING PROTOTYPES TO INSPIRE A GARDEN RAILWAY PROJECT

This month we'll visit another garden railroad club located in Gibsonville, NC.



The Gibsonville Garden Railroad (GGRR) was founded in 1996 by Bobby Summers, a retired Freight Conductor on the Southern Railway. Their first trains ran on October 9, 1996, which coincides with the first train arriving at Gibson Station on October 9, 1855. Their buildings are arranged to represent Gibsonville in 1855 and 1922, so the Town Historic Walking Tour map can be used to understand the layout. It covers all of North Carolina from Blowing Rock and Pilot Mountain to the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse. They include dioramas for Elon Homes, Elon College, Company Shops (Burlington), a gold mine, and tar making. You can see both Orville and Wilbur Wright flyers and cable cars too.

The GGRR has over 2900 feet of G-scale train track with 22 trains running at one time. They are open **EVERY** Saturday between April to November from 9:00 a.m. to noon.

THE BACKSHOP MODELING PROJECTS AND TIPS

A Southern Railway Caboose By: Scott Williams

I could never find a Southern Railway bay window caboose at train shows or on eBay, so I bought a less expensive Pennsylvania RR model on eBay. I stripped the pad printing from the body to repaint it to resemble the caboose at the Hender-

sonville Depot.



To do that I used Solvaset and an old-fashioned ink pencil style eraser. Apply some Solvaset on the printing and let sit for a few minutes then GENTLY rub the letters. It will be slow at first, but the lettering will eventually come off in time and leave a buffed surface. It may even go to a different base color but that's okay because you're going to repaint anyway. What you DON'T want to do is to rub hard enough to physically chew up the model surface prior to painting.

Then, what works best for me is to paint the model with a gray or brown primer spray can and let it cure for a day or two and then use whatever paint you want to spray can or airbrush to paint it. In my case I found the best match to be a can of Rustoleum "Ford Tractor Red". After that dries and sits I spray a clear glosscote of Testor's or Krylon Clear. Water slide decals don't seem to stick well to anything other than gloss painted surfaces. I have been buying my decals from Jeff Damerst at Shawmut Car Shops since Stan Cedarleaf passed away. I believe there are other sources for custom decals though. Shawmut Car Shops — Painting Trains One Car at a Time is a great source.

After I have applied the decals, I lightly spray one or two coats of <u>gloss</u> clear to seal the decals to the car body and I hand painted the railings 'Sunburst Yellow' Vallejo acrylic paint.

After that has dried, I then spray a clear matte coat like Testor's Dullcote to tone down that fresh from the paint shop look. If I want to go further than that I apply dirty gray/brown weathering washes. Then maybe another matte coat to seal it and protect the finish.

Some thoughts on LED lighting By: Wayne Hamilton

I was inspired by our last Train-Fest regarding LED lighting for passenger cars. I have a set of USA Trains passenger cars which have incandescent lighting. Since I use battery power, these are a huge power draw. I have seen and even bought replacement lighting strips at a significant cost; too costly for all my cars. After a bunch of "Amazon" research, came up with a way to build my own lighting strips.

The original strips have a mounting clip which I wanted to reuse.



Here's what I came up with and I am not endorsing any particular products. As they say, your mileage may vary.

The CoB type LED strip is self-adhesive, very bright and the metal channels already have screw holes for reusing the mounting clips. This arrangement means I can replace the stock lighting with LEDs for about \$11.00 per car. A real bargain! A poor photo of the strip being installed in a baggage car.



RAILROAD TRIVIA ANSWER

The New York Central was not known to conduct logging operations, but its 1940 roster listed five Shay type locomotives, Nos. 7185-7189. The NYC Shays had three 12x12-inch cylinders that, through the gears, drove 36-inch wheels. They weighed 139,400 pounds, and with 200 pounds per square inch of boiler pressure they developed 27,320 pounds of tractive effort. They were built in 1923 by Lima Locomotive Works for use on the West Side Freight Line in New York City, chiefly on street trackage on 10th and 11th Avenues. An old city ordinance required them to be covered to avoid frightening horses, and they also had to be preceded by a horse and rider when operating in the street.



When most of the street trackage was removed and the West Side line electrified, around 1934, the Shays were replaced by box-cab diesels that could also run from third-rail electrification or on battery power. The Shays were transferred to western New York State for use on the Genessee Falls Railway, an industrial line in Rochester, and the Owasco River Railway, with trackage around Auburn — both NYC subsidiaries. The Marcellus & Otisco Lake (M&OL) RR leased #7185 in 1942. It was returned to the New York Central RR in January 1943 with a broken frame and exchanged for #7187. The Shays were scrapped in 1948. Also, this was not an unusual practice as the Union Freight RR of Boston, MA had box cab Climax locomotives.
